



Her family has largely depended on migration to various cities across India to work as causal labourers. Her father had migrated to Punjab to work as an agricultural labourer to repay the loan taken for his father's funeral. Similarly, her two brothers had migrated to Maharashtra for work previously. However, their experience with migration remains bitter as both Dewanti's brothers died when they migrated for employment. The family bemoans that they could not even get back the dead bodies of their children after death.

Given their own lack of education, Dewanti's parents do not know how much she has studied. They believe that got to know about Kaushal College through her school teacher and was inspired to train as a nurse. However, they liked the ambience of the Kaushal College and were assured by the teachers at Kaushal College that she is now like the daughter of Kaushal College. They hope that she would be treated as their own.






